

WHY IS SIACHEN DIFFICULT TO DEFEND?

Apart from the twin military threats from Pakistan and China, the climate condition is the biggest challenge for the Armed Forces. The temperature in Siachen glacier, in winters drops to below -60 degrees.





Soldiers stationed in the area are affected by a range of fatal altitude-related ailments like frost bites (a skin injury that occurs when exposed to extreme low temperatures), hypoxia (body is deprived of adequate oxygen supply), hypothermia (body loses heat faster than it can produce heat), and white outs (dense blizzard)

VHAT'S THE COST OF

Both India and Pakistan have deployed around 5,000 troops (brigade strength). For India, costs of maintenance in the region is about ₹ 5 crore a day. India has spent over ₹ 7,500 crore for procurement of clothing and mountaineering equipment for soldiers (as of 2019) In terms of human cost, as many 869 Indian soldiers have lost their lives in Siachen since 1984 due to climatic conditions, in comparison to around 2,000 Pak soldiers (as of 2019)

Meanwhile, qualification testing of cryogenic engine for Gaganyaan programme successful: ISRO

ISRO has successfully conducted the qualification test of cryogenic engine for the Gaganyaan programme for a duration of 720 seconds at the ISRO Propulsion Complex, Mahendragiri, Tamil Nadu. "This successful long-duration test is a major milestone for the Human Space Programme -Gaganyaan. It ensures the reliability and robustness of the cryogenic engine for induction into the human-rated launch vehicle for Gaganyaan", an ISRO statement said.

Located in the eastern range in the Himalayas, the Siachen glacier, spread over a 76.4 km-area, is the longest glacier in the Karakoram and second-longest in the world's non-polar(oc**cur in high mountain ranges)** areas. It demarcates central Asia from the Indian subcontinent, and separates Pakistan from China in the region. It is also believed to be the world's highest battlefield.

ris Siachen important: The Saltoro Ridge Siachin glacier serves as a divide that prevents direct linking of PoK with China, stopping them from developing geographical military linkages in the area. Siachen also serves as a watchtower for India to keep a deep watch on Gilgit and Baltistan regions of Pakistan. If Pakistan gets the location advantage in Siachen, it would become a big threat to India from the west in Ladakh in addition to Chinese threats from Aksai Chin of the east. Siachen also helps India to keep a close watch on China's activities, as Beijing has vastly improved its infrastructure in this region.

India gained con**trol over it:** In ear-**V** ly 1981, Narinder Bull Kumar sounded the alarm over Pakistan's expeditions in the Siachen region. On April 13, 1984, India launched Operation Meghdoot to capture the 76.4 km-long glacier on the Saltoro ridge. Since then troops from both sides guard the region.Though the guns on the gla cier have fallen silent, following the 2003 ceasefire along the Line of Control (LoC) and the Actual Ground Position Line (AGPL) across the Siachen, the LoC has flared up intermittently.

India has shown willingness for demilitarisation, albeit conditional on first authenticating the 110-km AGPL, which is the current position on the glacier. But Pakistan refuses, which means that once currently has the advantage of height, as it commands higher ground, and any demilitarisation without proper delineation and acceptance of the current positions would be disastrous. Retaking once-occupied peaks is near impossible

FACE MASKS HALVE DISTANCE OF AIRBORNE PATHOGENS' TRAVEL: STUDY

he effectiveness of face masks has been a hotly-debated topic since the emergence of Covid-19. However, a new study shows that masks could also help reduce social distancing. Researchers found that face

masks reduce the distance airborne pathogens could travel, when speaking or coughing by more than half, compared to not wearing a mask. A cloth face covering reduced emissions in all directions to about two feet compared to the four feet of emissions pro-

duced when coughing or speaking with no mask on. The reduction was even greater when wearing a surgical mask, which reduced the distance coughing and speaking emissions travelled to only about half a foot.

■ The findings are important, as airborne viral pathogens, such as SARS-CoV-2, can be encapsulated and transmitted through liquid droplets and aerosols formed during human respiratory func-

> tions, such as speaking and coughing Knowing ways to reduce this transmission distance can help keep people safe and aid in managing responses to pandemics, such as Covid-19, which has resulted in global-scale infection, health care system

Double Sydney centurion Usman Khawaja will move up to open the batting for Australia in the final Test beginning in Hobart on Friday, captain Pat Cummins confirmed Thursday

ummins announced Khawaja would replace Marcus Harris as David Warner's opening partner with Travis Head slotting back in at number five for the day-night pink-ball match after sitting out the fourth Test in Sydney with Covid. With Head cleared to play, Australia opted to retain Khawaja -- who scored 137 and 101 not out in Sydney. The 35year-old Khawaja has been in and out of the Australian team, but his twin centuries in Sydney made it impossible to drop him for the fifth Test, especially considering his form and experience at the top of the order. He has opened the batting in five Tests, scoring two centuries and averaging 96.80.

HARRIS TO BE DROPPED

Harris, who has struggled to make an impact with a top score of 76 in the series, will be omitted. Harris has been given a number of chances over his career, but in 14 matches he has not scored a century and is averaging just over 25. "The message to Harry (Harris) is that he is going really well, it's just that it's not too often that someone comes in and scores two centuries in the same game," Cummins

Cummins said a final decision on whether to play bowler Scott Boland will be made later Thursday, with the Victorian seamer being given a final chance to prove he has recovered from sore ribs he suffered when he fell in the Sydney Test. If he is out injured, then Jhye

Richardson is the likely replacement.

There had been some talk of elevating Marnus Labuschagne to open, but Cummins said that was never a possibility. "We're really happy with Ussie opening," he said. "He's a class player and can bat anywhere. From the selectors' point of view, and my point of view, he can bat from one to six.'

UNCERTAINLY OVER PITCH

The Hobart wicket was looking very green 24 hours before the match and Cummins said he was unsure as to how it would play. "I think especially the first few days there will hopefully be a bit of seam, a bit of swing," he said. "Sometimes when it's really cold at night it doesn't do as much, but I don't know if that will be the case. "Every pink ball Test, it feels like there are a lot of unknowns, but probably more so now because it's a new venue."

Cummins said one of the most pleasing aspects of the series, which Australia lead 3-0, was that the team wasn't relying on one or two players, and that the newcomers had stepped up when selected. "It's been great to have these other guys come in and not only feel comfortable, but to dominate straight away," he said. "It's a real nod to the amount of talent we have around Australia." AGENCIES

Rudiger's first half header ensured Chelsea pressed home the advantage they had earned with a 2-0 win in the semi-final first leg last week. Tuchel's team also had VAR official Mike Dean on their side as Tottenham were given two penalties by Andre Marriner, only for reviews to overturn both, while Harry Kane saw a goal disallowed for offside.

Tuchel displeased

"We started good. We had big chances and controlled the match, but I had the feeling we played with fire," Tuchel said. "We allowed chances from sloppy mistakes and were lucky. We almost gave a penalty away We needed luck to not give away another penalty, to have an offside VAR decision."

Tuchel is the first manager in Chelsea's history to lead the club to the Champions League, FA Cup and League Cup finals, a feat he has achieved just 350 days after his first game in charge in January 2020. It is Chelsea's first League Cup final appearance since 2019 as they aim to win the competition for the first time since 2015. "We need to play better if we're going to really deserve results like this. We have to meet the standards," Tuchel said.
